

William H. DePouli, Trustee, Retires

The first trustee of the the Montauk Library, Bill DePouli, has announced his retirement from the Board of Trustees. See page 4 in the newsletter for an article about Mr. DePouli.

The unexpired term of Mr. DePouli will be filled by Marshal Leber. Mr. Leber and his wife, Patty, have had a house on Soundview Drive for 10 years. Mr. Leber recently retired to Montauk from New Jersey where he was a Vice-President, Senior Financial Consultant of Merrill Lynch. He also serves as a trustee for a university scholarship fund. The Lebers have two children: Brett, 12 and Chelsea, 6, who attend the Montauk School.

BUILDING DEVELOPMENT NEWS

The contract for the installation of the elevator in the library has been awarded to Lipsky Enterprises Inc. of Bayport. Installation will begin this winter, and be finished by Spring.

Drawings for Phase I of the Lower Level have been submitted to the State Education Department Bureau of Facilities Planning in Albany for approval. The fundraising campaign has been so successful that we can begin work on the restrooms, the archival room and the expanded Friends rooms as soon as our documents are approved, and in fact must begin in order to retain the grant for \$48,000 which was awarded us for construction.

We are also in the process of preparing a grant application for Phase II which will finish the meeting room and lobby. We hope that Congress does not cut funding for education, which includes libraries.

A REMINISCENCE AND A TRIBUTE

No dreams deferred for William H. DePouli, a founding father of the Library

For William H. DePouli, who is retiring this year from the Board of Trustees, the 15th anniversary of the Montauk Library marks a milestone in his dream. In a recent interview he recounted his role in the founding of the library. Dreams for DePouli are challenges to be met and brought to fruition.

A large and imposing man, DePouli has deep religious beliefs which permeate much of what he says and does. He recognizes that he has "slowed down" in recent months, the result in large part of the severe arthritis which has affected both hips. About whether he will have the hips replaced, he said "I will pray long and hard on that one."



In discussing the evolution of the library, he stated that for years the hamlet had been served by a bookmobile dispatched from Bellport, headquarters for the Suffolk Cooperative Library System, and one of New York State's regional libraries. But as Montauk's population began soaring

in recent years, he said "people began to squawk that there wasn't enough of a selection. After all, the bookmobile could only carry about 2,000 books and today we have 20,000 books in this building."

And so he began exploring possibilities. He remembers talking with John Ecker who recommended that he speak with State Senator Kenneth LaValle, Chairman of the State Education Committee which oversees the State's library system. "He guided us to those in state government who could best help us." In these years of exploration and research, he says he made "umpteen trips to Albany," in search of the necessary approvals.

The approvals secured, the next basic question was where to locate the library. As an Elder of the Community Church, DePouli was able to mount a persuasive argument to rent the small building adjacent to its property to the library committee for a dollar a year.

He recalls the arduous work of rehabilitating the structure - knocking down walls, strengthening the columns in the basement so they would hold the enormous weight of the books and installing new wiring and electrical outlets. The job was finished in four months. With a loan from the Suffolk System and with the books from five bookmobiles which the system was decommissioning and the help of many cheerful volunteers, Montauk's first library opened on November 25, 1980.

"It took off like a rocket," DePouli said with obvious pride.

Ever restless to build a new modern home for the

library, DePouli and the Board of Trustees (Barbara Borth, John Keeshan, Audrey Grimes, Lynn Holmes, Richard Webb and Minnie Proctor), with the help of Frank Tuma, purchased land across the road. They would endure many difficulties and cope with the complicated approval process and financial constraints before actual construction began. The new Montauk Library was opened on November 24, 1991.

Shortly the library will be the scene of new construction activity. Funds are now being raised to incorporate additional amenities and features that were eliminated from the original design because of lack of funds.

"I give the Lord Jesus all the credit for what I've done," says DePouli. "The Library has been a way to reach out to the children of the community, but also to the child in each and every one of us. I've been blessed and I feel if I hadn't been, what we have here today wouldn't have come into existence."

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE FRIENDS



The Montauk Library formally opened its doors to the public in November 1980, but some six months earlier the Friends of the Montauk Library was providing a framework for a permanent and ongoing volunteer effort on its behalf.

The Friends' first official meeting was led by cofounders Stephanie Krusa and Suzanne Koch Gosman on May 22, 1980. They served as president and vice president respectively for two years; Ms. Koch Gosman served as president for three years; Jane Liebell and Donna Etzel served as co-presidents for two years; Eileen Bock was president for five years; and Robert Silverstone is currently serving his third year as president. During the first year the Friends' volunteers held bake sales to raise seed money to provide community activities related to the Library. They also held two successful book fairs to raise money for its operation. Before the Library

was open the Friends held meetings, programs, and children's story hours wherever they could find space, which included the Montauk Community and St. Therese's Churches, and the Montauk School.

The Friends cooperates with the Library Trustees, but is a completely independent organization with a constitution and by-laws. It was formally incorporated on April 22, 1983 by the Board of Regents of the State University on behalf of the New York State Education Department. The primary purpose of the organization is to meet community, educational and cultural needs above and beyond the physical and budgetary limitations of the Library. Friends reaches out to the community with a variety of activities and services, inviting participation and involvement from children and adults.

In the fifteen years of its existence, the Friends has contributed approximately \$128,000 to the Library for equipment as well as for its development. Over the past

three years the Friends has been instrumental in raising funds toward the \$300,000 goal of the Library's Building Fund. Eileen Bock
