TRUSTEE ELECTION

Barbara Borth, one of the original trustees, is running for a new 5 year term. Barbara has served as Secretary of the Board of Trustees for 18 years. She has headed many committees and currently is organizing the Archival Room for the Library.

Robert Silverstone, who served as President of Friends of the Montauk Library for several years. and and has served as a trustee since 1996. Bob heads the Technology Committee for the Library. Bob is running for a five year term.

James Sullivan is running to fill the unexpired term of Irene D'Agostino. Jim was appointed to the Board in 1997 and serves on the Building and Grounds Committee and the Budget Committee. This term is for two years.

FINANCIAL PLANNING SEMINAR

The month of May will bring a Seminar in Financial Planning to the Library. Ed Porco, who has recently retired to live in Montauk full time, will lead a seminar covering many aspects of Financial planning. Mr. Porco, who has been a financial



consultant since 1961, retired from Wall Street four years ago and has taught courses on Investments at Molloy College and Southampton College. On May 5th and May 12, two consecutive Tuesdays at 7:30 pm, Mr. Porco will give two hour seminar on topics such as how to plan for future monetary needs including: short, medium and long term goals; what should be included in a portfolio of investments; a description of the different types of stocks, bonds, and mutual funds; and the concept of reward and risk. Now the library costs \$6.91 per \$1000 of assessed valuation. The Proposed budget will cost \$9.14 per \$1000 of assessed valuation...or an increase of 2.23 per \$1000. If your assessed valuation is \$5000, you would pay \$45.70 for your library service for 1998-99. Good value for your tax dollars!

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

In order to be eligible to vote on any library matter, you must be a registered voter. If you are not registered: Registration will be at the library on Monday, April 20, 1998 from 4 pm to 8 pm. In order to register you must be:

•A US Citizen

•A District Resident for at least 30 days prior to April 20, 1998

•the address on your a)driver's license,b)Federal Income Tax Forms.c)automobile registration.and/or

d)Government registration forms.

do not have to own property

If you cannot vote on election day, you can register and be ready for the next election.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Applications for absentee ballots can be obtained at the office of the School District Clerk. Such applications must be in to the Clerk (Regina Stone) 7 days before the vote if the ballot is to be mailed, or one day before if it is to be hand delivered. All absentee ballots must be received by the Clerk no later than 5 pm of the day of the vote at the library.

LOWER LEVEL II CONTRACTS AWARDED

Construction will begin this Spring on the Meeting Room. On February 24, the Board of Trustees awarded the 3 contracts for the completion of the multi-purpose room which will seat 125 people in a small, elegant auditorium, and will also be able to be used for workshops.

The contract for General Construction was awarded to J.T. Reilly of Bayport, the Electrical contract went to Conserve Electric of Patchogue, and the HVAC contract went to Lowell Mechanical of Medford. Construction will begin this Spring, and we hope to open the entire Lower Level in late 1998.

PARKING LOT

The Board of Trustees is now working with the Town on our parking lot expansion. As part of the Montauk Athletic Field Project, the Montauk tennis courts are planned to be moved to the State Right of Way just east of the library, and the old tennis court site will become a rollerblade rink. We will share our expanded parking lot with the tennis courts, thereby making 80 total parking spaces available to us. At present we have 32, and those who attend programs at the library know how cramped the parking lot is now. We are in the process of obtaining the surveys and plans required by the State Department of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation for use of the land, and hope for a speedy resolution of this issue.


HRCHIVHL ROOM


MEZZANINE GRANT

The Board of Trustees has received news that the State Education Department division of Facilities Planning has awarded the Montauk Library another LSCA Title II grant in the amount of \$20,561 to be used for construction of the Mezzanine Level of the Library. This is the last year for the LSCA construction grants. Federal money for libraries will be earmarked for Technological Development for the next few years. We, of course will apply for whatever grants we can for our library.

We have been very fortunate to have received many LSCA grants to help us build the Montauk Library. Our Library was one of only two in Suffolk County to receive grants in the last round. If all goes as planned, we hope to have all construction completed by the year 2000.

NEWS from the Friends...

WINTER HAPPENINGS

The Friends of the Montauk Library started off 1998 with a wealth of interesting and educational programs. Plans are being made for even more activities this Spring and Summer.

In January the Friends' annual Pot Luck Supper was held at the Montauk Firehouse. The popular event attracted more



then 80 persons who enjoyed good food and camaraderie. (Much thanks to the Montauk Fire Department's volunteers who helped set up for the event.)

In February Montauk resident and traveler Peter Lowenstein presented an extremely interesting slide show at the Library, which focused on his trips to New Guinea. Mr. Lowenstein delivered a commentary along with the slides illustrating his experiences above and below the waters surrounding the island off the coast of Australia. The presentation left the large audience well informed and hoping they could experience the same adventure someday.

On March 1, Prof. John Thierfeld, assistant professor of Arts and Humanities at Dowling College in Oakdale, once again visited Montauk to present a program on the opera "La Bolieme." Prof. Thierfeld related the plot of the opera and showed two videos of performances by separate opera companies, which gave insight into different techniques used to perform the popular Puccini work.

As a follow up, the Friends sponsored a bus trip to see the opera performed "live" at Lincoln Center on March 21. The tickets sold out quickly.

Another bus trip, held in December, to see the annual Christmas Show at Radio City Music Hall was also a sell out.

FRIDAY NIGHT MOVIES

Robert Molnar and Jane Warr are to be commended for putting together the Friday Night Movie program this past winter. Reports are that the popular program drew many people to the library for movies and free popcorn. The last film "Captain's Paradise" was viewed on March 13.
