The increases for this year, \$9,760 include the hiring of a part-time page, the inclusion of a part-time custodian for the meeting room, increase in our building insurance for the inclusion of the entire lower level (previously insured under the construction contractors.)

The remainder of the budget has been adjusted, both up and down, according to actual figures from the past 12 months. The budget increase amounts to 3.73%, 34¢ per \$1000 of assessed valuation (using the 1998 assessed valuation figure.)

This year the ballot will read:

RESOLVED: that the proposed budget of expenditures of the Montauk Library for the fiscal year 1999-2000 in the amount and for the purposes shown in the statement of estimated expenditures adopted by the Board of Trustees, be and the same hereby is approved and the amount thereof shall be raised by a levy of a tax upon the taxable property of the school district.

There will also be a ballot which asks you to vote for one trustee. Joan M. Lycke is running unopposed.

Now the library costs \$9.11 per \$1000 of assessed valuation. The Proposed budget will cost \$9.45 per \$1000 of assessed valuation...or an increase of 34 ¢ per \$1000. If your assessed valuation is \$5000, you would pay \$47.25 for your library service for 1999-2000. Good value for your tax dollars!

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

In order to be eligible to vote on any library matter, you must be a registered voter. If you are not registered; registration will be at the library on Wednesday, April 14, 1999, from 4 pm to 8 pm. In order to register you must be:

- •18 years old
- •A US Citizen
- •A District Resident for at least 30 days prior to April 14, 1999

Proof of Legal Residence is:

•the address on your a)driver's license, b)Federal Income Tax Forms, c)automobile registration,and/or d)Government registration forms.

TO VOTE YOU:

- •do not have to own property
- •do not have to have a library card
- •must be a registered voter


If you cannot vote on election day, you can register and be ready for the next election.

Such applications must be in to the Clerk (Regina Stone) 7 days before the vote if the ballot is to be mailed, or one day before if it is to be hand delivered. All absentee ballots must be received by the Clerk no later than 5 pm of the day of the vote at the library.



InfoTrac Searchbank sm

A reminder to students researching topics for school assignments or anyone seeking information which appears in any number of journals: The library offers an on-line Reference service - InfoTrac Searchbank to our patrons. It is available in the library and through your SuffolkWeb home computer account.

Searchbank provides indexing of thousands of magazine and newspaper articles as well as the ability to view and retreive full text articles. Available on Searchbank are Magazine Index, General Business File, Health Reference Center, SIRS Researcher, and National Newspaper Index (indexing 5 national newspapers.)

Searchbank is available 24 hours a day from the Montauk Library Home Page with your SuffolkWeb home connection, and available on the library's Interlibrary loan computer - look for the magazines ICON.

THE INTERNET & THE LIBRARY SuffolkNet SuffolkWeb



We have enlisted the services of John Gibbons, a computer consultant, to provide technical support for the Library computer systems and to assist our patrons with problems they may have in using SuffolkNet. Mr. Gibbons is an innovative and versatile technical educator with an extensive background in computer science and the Internet. He has conducted SuffolkNet workshops in the Library on Feb.22 and March 2 and will periodically conduct additional workshops. Check with the Library for dates. Mr. Gibbons will also be available for support by telephone consultation.

We urge those of you who signed up for SuffolkNet, but are not using it because of difficulties you may have encountered, to contact the Library to arrange for support.

If you have a computer at home and have not yet signed up, you are missing a great free service. SuffolkNet provides email service and access to thousands of web sites. You will also get access to Search Bank, an on-line reference resource to thousands of magazines, journals and newspapers. Applications are available at the circulation desk.
