VOTE AND ELECTION INCLUDE:

- 1. To adopt the Annual Budget of the Montauk Library for the fiscal year 2025-2026 and to authorize the requisite portion thereof to be raised by taxation on the taxable property of the Montauk Union Free School
- 2. To elect one (1) Trustee of the Montauk Library for a five (5) year term commencing July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2030, to succeed Marilyn Levine, whose term expires on June 30, 2025.
- 3. To elect one (1) Trustee of the Montauk Library for a five (5) year term commencing July 1, 2025 and ending June 30, 2030, to succeed Lisa Valcich, whose term expires on June 30, 2025.
- 4. To elect one (1) Trustee of the Montauk Library to fill the unexpired term due to the vacancy of the position previously held by Carter Tyler, commencing April 8, 2025, and expiring on June 30, 2027.

Absentee ballots may be applied for at the Office of the Clerk of the Montauk Union Free School District between 8 AM and 3 PM Monday through Friday. Applications for absentee ballots are due to the school district clerk by 5 PM on April 1, 2025 if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter or 5 PM on April 7, 2025 if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter. The board of registration shall make a list of all persons to whom absentee voters' ballots have been issued and shall have it available in the Office of the School District Clerk during regular business hours on each of the five (5) days prior to April 8, 2025, except Sunday. Absentee ballots are due to the School District Clerk no later than 5 PM on April 8, 2025. Contact glightcap@ montaukschool.org for more information.








FROM THE CIRCULATION DESK

What does the Montauk Library's circulation desk have to offer?

Books, books, and more books, not to mention magazines, puzzles, and back issues of newspapers. If a book isn't on a shelf here it can be requested from another library. Staff members are happy to provide reading suggestions.

There are also DVDs of movies and TV series, and a DVD player that Montauk Library cardholders can borrow from our Library of Things. Did you know that the library also lends music CDs and passes to places like the Children's Museum and the Montauk Lighthouse? Patrons will also find discounted tickets for the Long Island Aquarium and, in season, the Viking Fleet's whale-watching cruises.

The library has a bulletin board for displaying community flyers, as well as information about all of the library's free events and opportunities to socialize, including movies, concerts, yoga, Reiki, qigong, and art and knitting classes. We periodically offer AARP tax preparation assistance, driving safety classes, and workshops on trusts, elder law, Medicare, and other topics.



New this year, thanks to the introduction of a new staff member, Wendy Arias, are a growing number of bilingual services. Wendy is available to assist Spanish-speaking patrons, and provides Spanish-language versions of our weekly digests of library programs.

TRUSTEE CANDIDATES

MARILYN LEVINE has been a Montauk resident for almost 25 years. Before moving to Montauk, she had a long career as a pediatric occupational therapist. Marilyn has served as a library trustee for 10 years. Prior to serving as president, she was the board's financial secretary. During Marilyn's tenure as board president, the Montauk Library undertook a major renovation and expansion that has helped it become the community and cultural center of Montauk. The library has evolved over the past several years and it will continue to evolve as our community evolves. Marilyn looks forward to continuing to help lead the library as one of the finest in Suffolk County.



LINDA NORRIS has been a year-round resident of Montauk for nearly 30 years. Originally from the Bronx, she started to spend summers here when her family built a home in 1980. After completing graduate school, she made Montauk her full-time home and took a position with the Town of East Hampton, where she has remained a dedicated civil servant for more than 28 years. Linda raised her two adult daughters, Emma and Lilly, in Montauk and volunteered as a Little League coach, Parent Teacher Association member, and with Montauk Youth. She is a longtime member and deacon of the Montauk Community Church, having served as a Sunday school



teacher and on numerous committees through the years. The Montauk Library has been and remains an integral part of her life, she said, and she hopes to help ensure that it continues to meet the needs of the entire community. She is running for a five-year term on the Board of Trustees.

LISA VALCICH was born and raised in Montauk. As her daughter, Catherine, was growing up, the books and programs at the Montauk Library made it a regular destination. A purchasing agent for East Hampton Town who also works for her brother's local carting company, Lisa is a volunteer firefighter in the Montauk Fire Department and a member and treasurer of the Montauk Village Association as well as a member, lecturer, and catechist for St. Therese of Lisieux. She helps organize the annual Tyler Valcich Memorial Car Show to raise funds and awareness for the prevention of suicide. Lisa sat on the Board of Trustees for the library from 2008 through 2015 and in



2024 was elected to fill the final year of an uncompleted five-year term. She is running for a full five-year term this year.

The Montauk Library Youth Services Department is a vibrant part of our community — offering engaging, educational, and fun programs for young patrons from birth to 18 years.

Our Summer Reading Club was a standout in 2024. We expanded participation to children as young as two years old and we had a great response. With four grand prizes and weekly raffles, our program offered an abundance of themed books, engaging activities, and passive programs that brought the joy of reading to all all participants.

Our Children's Book Author Series was another highlight. We had the privilege of hosting several talented local authors, each of whom shared their book and performed songs or led fun activities. These events were thoroughly enjoyed by audiences of all ages.









We introduced a variety of exciting new programs, including Mommy and Me Yoga, Sensory Bin Play, Magna-Tile Club, Organic Gardening, Ducks at Story Time, and Video Game Character Drawing. They were met with excitement and a focus on creativity, learning, and making connections.

Our College Essay Writing Program was great for teens preparing college applications. It provided guidance and support to help students develop strong personal essays that reflect their unique stories and goals.

We officially opened our Tween Room, expanded our Toy Library, introduced oversized picture books to the children's area, and also added a tabletop puzzle station for our tweens.

TECHNOLOGY NEWS

2025 is set to be another strong year for digital engagment and connectivity at the Montauk Library.

The Local History Center has become a favorite location for distance workers. With its wrap-around counter, high seating, built-in charge points, proximity to fast printers, excellent Wi-Fi, and pleasant views, patrons feel comfortable setting up their workstations.

Our new search station, self-check, and inter-library pickup corner is popular with independent patrons who manage their own library loans. The business center is always available for patrons to print, copy, scan, fax, laminate, trim, or shred. Many people come here to print, fax, scan, or copy their tax documents. If the area is already in use, we have a second workstation upstairs with a spectacular view where patrons can also scan, copy, and fax.

Visit montauklibrary.org/reserve, where patrons can schedule a time slot for our podcast room or small meeting room, and schedule appointments for passport, notary assistance, and proctoring sessions.

Don't forget: The library is also prepared to help visitors who conduct their digital life solely on their phone or iPad. Mobile printing and scanning, Zoom meetings, access to movies, books, audiobooks, and interlibrary requests are all just a few taps away.

Try our new search tool – VEGA! – on the library's website (montauklibrary.org). This intuitive, user-friendly program allows patrons to search for books, e-books, audiobooks, movies, and other resources. You can also bookmark items and, after logging in, see what's checked out and any holds, fines, bookmarks, saved searches, and reading history. Search results will also display the call number used at the patron's home or preferred library.

In 2024, we welcomed folks into the archives to engage with historical materials, local authors, and each other through programs, exhibits, and open research hours.

- We invited patrons to get hands-on with history at an inaugural Archives Show and Tell event.
- Local author Bill Akin read from his new book The Equanimity of Fishes: Stories and Reflections from Seven Decades in Montauk.

- Betsy McCully, writer and naturalist, presented on the natural history of Long Island.
- Tony Caramanico joined us for an exhibit and book talk about his Montauk surf journals.
- Donna Corvi shared her paintings of Montauk trees on the community room walls.
- The Montauk Playhouse Community Center Foundation donated materials documenting the foundation's project to build the new aquatic and cultural center.
- The Amagansett Life-Saving & Coast Guard Station Museum displayed objects and photographs from its collection in our Local History Exhibit Center.
- Jack Perna, William Gosman, and Captain Donnie Braddick contributed their stories to our Oral History Program.
- Patrons submitted over 250 photographs to our community slideshows.
- Family photograph collections from the Duryea and Cahill-Stayton Eurell families of Montauk were added to New York Heritage Digital Collections.

In 2024, the Montauk Library offered a wide variety of outstanding Adult Programs:

- A Creative Communities/Long Island grant made it possible to co-sponsor some very special programs commemorating the 500th anniversary of Verrazzano's voyage to North America in 1524. These included an exceptional concert by the charismatic soprano Cristina Fontanelli, accompanied by pianist Alexander Chaplinskiy, entitled "Italian Songs of the Sea/ Canzoni Italiane del Mare." Another special event in this series was "Verrazzano in His Own Words." Performed by actor Bob Spiotto, this was a monologue based on a letter written by Verrazzano in 1524 to the King of France. Part of this special series was a dynamic concert by The Jordan Shapiro Trio of "Ballads and Folk Music of Long Island's Maritime Past."
- There were other superb concerts and programs. The incredible Alexander Chaplinskiy was so impressive we invited him to return to perform a stirring solo concert of works by Ukrainian composers.
- When photographer Laura Vanderbeek presented her guidebook to beaches in the Hamptons, percussionists Max Vanderbeek and Dalton Portella were on board with a dynamic concert that rocked the building. As the winter holidays approached, we enjoyed two delightful concerts featuring Montauk talent: an upbeat performance by The Ukeladies and a delightful singalong with singer/songwriter Lori Hubbard.
- A conversation with the singer, composer, and raconteur Joe Delia had us spellbound as he talked about his experiences in the music world. He also screened scenes from films he scored and shared an exclusive video message to us from the acclaimed filmmaker Abel Ferrara.
- Our guest speakers covered a wide range of subjects, including estate planning, feng shui, medical topics, fiction, and cuisine. Chef Mel Asseraf not only signed copies of her cookbook, *Sweet Treats*, but also made delicious crepes for everyone! Other regularly scheduled programs, which continue, included Book 'Tauk, a book club that meets once per month, and a series of classic films screened every Friday at 5 pm.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

The library works in partnership with local organizations like the Montauk Food Pantry, the Retreat, the Lions Club, Kiwanis, ARF, and East Hampton Rotary to collect donations, especially during the days of our Great Giveback and holiday mitten tree.



The East Hampton Town Board holds monthly work sessions in in the library's community room and many community groups, including the Montauk Playhouse Foundation, Montauk Citizens Advisory Committee, the Chamber of Commerce, the Community Church, and the Montauk School use the Montauk Library's spaces for meetings, exhibits, and storage.

Library staff have been reading stories to children at the Montauk Child Care Center and the village gazebo. Watch for new community outreach programs in 2025!

AROUND THE LIBRARY



The NAUTI KNITTERS group meets twice weekly at the library to knit, crochet, and socialize. The group has flourished, growing in both friendship and size, with outings, special celebrations, and shared moments captured on their own social media page. Many of their creations—scarves, hats, and stuffed animals—are donated to the Friends of the Montauk Library's holiday sale and the Retreat.

In 2024 we began the **TREX CHALLENGE**—collecting 1,000 pounds of discarded stretchy plastics, which we submitted to Trex, a composite decking company, for recycling. As a result, the library received a free bench manufactured, in part, from recycled plastic film. Stay tuned for details on this year's challenge!
